## North Wales & Mercia Regional Report

Our region had a good year, with the final event being the Annual lamb show at Stafford show-ground in November. It was the best attended to date, with 86 lambs and lots of new exhibitors. The standard was also the highest we have had, and far more ram lambs were on show as in previous years. The event was expertly organised by Karen Turnbull as usual, and ran like clockwork. We were fortunate to have Tim Tyne judging the show classes who is one of the most experienced and respected commercial judges in the country. We like to use a commercial judge rather than a purely Ryeland one to put the emphasis on correct conformation and

suitability as breeding stock rather than judging the finished article in terms of condition, presentation and 'cosmetic' attributes of the lamb, though of course breed standards were strictly adhered to throughout.

It was lovely to see exhibitors from all parts of the country not just our own region, and congratulations go to all those who took the prizes away. A really enjoyable meal was organised at the wonderful Chinese buffet restaurant on the Saturday night which 25 attended. The Sunday saw wool on the hoof classes and a talk all about wool from the senior grader at the wool board, Ian Brooksbanks, as well as young handler and a charity fancy dress class. We also held a Craft Competition and the Fleece and Yarn committee organised a lovely informative stand so thank you to Lin for that! Hopefully some of those who read this will be tempted to come along next year with or without their lambs as there is so much that can be learnt as well as having a lot of fun.

There have been some changes to our regional committee, and we now have a 'social media and marketing' role which has been taken on by Gareth Silvester. This

Family and friends paid tribute to Richard with Eulogy's, Poems and Memories and in true show style we all went to the bar in the village hall. Richard's father Percy the founder of the Ruslin Flock helped build the hall in memory of his Brothers and Brother In-law after World War 1. In true Showmanship style the last round was on Richard.

## Tilly Liddiard - Cottage Ryelands

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My name is Tilly, and I am 12 years old, and I love farming and animals. I have 3 family, 2 siblings that help me, flock of 7 sheep including 3 Ryeland's, 3 coloured Ryeland's and 1 Suffolk mule.

In August 2019 when I was 9 years old my dad got a new job as a farm manager, when I found out we would be moving house to a farm I was lucky enough to start thinking about getting sheep which was my dream. When I asked my parents, my mum said yes however my dad

took a bit of convincing. However, he finally said yes!! So later in the year we went to Alresford show to see which breeds we liked the best. After thinking about the Suffolk's, I saw the Ryeland's and immediately fell in love with them.

In February 2020 we found 1 Ryeland and 1 coloured Ryeland ewes named peaches and angle. In that summer we met our good friend Harriet who also has Ryeland's in the same village. In November we put the ewes in with her rams and hoped that in April we would have some lambs. When scanning came around, we found out that my white Ryeland ewe peaches was pregnant with twins. On the 6th of April 2021 my two beautiful ewe lambs were born, and I named them Boo and Bambi, however it wasn't all smooth sailing from there on, peaches health started going downhill and so did the lambs due to a tricky birth. The lambs had to wear some little puppy jackets to keep their body heat up, we had to give peaches twin lamb drench every day until she got better, one week later all three were fit and fighting! It was all worth the long hours of TLC it because now almost 2 years later I have 2 beautiful shearling ewes that are now with our ram Greenfield Biscuit.

We have been to lots of shows in our first year with Harriet to see how the showing world works. To our surprise we did well, and I am very proud of my little flock. At our local show, Alresford, we decided to take my sheep Boo into the wool on the hoof class and won 1st place then went on to win the champion ship. A few weeks later we went to Findon sheep fair where it was the annual Southeast Ryeland show, with my mums help we won a 3rd place with Boo and a 1st place with Bambi in the shearling ewe class we then went on to win Ryeland champion this was a complete shock, and I was so happy. As well as the main class I also compete in young handlers every weekend which is a lot of fun and I have learned so much!

At the Ryeland sales in Devon, I brought my first shearling ram named Biscuit who I loved from the moment I saw him! I was so pleased we won the bid! This was very exciting and nerve racking. Biscuit has finished Topping my shearlings and I am really looking forward to seeing My homebred ewes lambing next April. We managed to sync topping with my easter holidays so I can be there when they are born.

Whilst on the lambing subject I thought I would share what I do on a typical lambing day with help from our friend who we share the barn with.

- Assist with Births if needed
- Dipping lamb's navels with iodine and weighing them
- Making sure ewes are feeding the lambs correctly in there bonding pens
- General Feeding and bedding up, and cleaning out dirty pens
- Assisting with drawing up medication if anything needs it.
- Turning ewes and Lambs out to a big turnout pen and numbering, castrating and docking
- Recording all information on our board.
- Look after pet lambs and cleaning out milk feeder.
- Most importantly looking at the lamb cam to see if anything is going to pop!

## The Shepherd's Examination

### Rectal temperature

Normal is 38.8-39.9°C.  
Fever is caused by infection or inflammation.

### Poor body condition

Check teeth if individuals are thin.  
Other causes include liver fluke and 'iceberg diseases'.

### Scour

Loose faeces can be caused by rich grass or dietary indiscretion but if the ewe is thin or unwell then it could be a sign of disease, parasites, or acidosis (from too much concentrate feed).

### Vulva

Is she lambing?  
Pregnant ewe: check for vaginal prolapse. Abnormal discharge could be a sign of impending abortion.  
After lambing: Check for uterine prolapse or retained placenta (>12 hrs). Abnormal discharge could indicate metritis (uterine infection).

### Udder

Toxic mastitis causes a hot, swollen, painful udder with abnormal, watery & bloody, or clotted milk.

### Observations from a distance

Subtle abnormalities and behaviour changes are often the first signs of illness. These may be more visible before the sheep is moved or caught.



Examine feet for signs of infection. A wobbly/weak gait may be a sign of a heavily pregnant ewe. Check a large udder. Other causes include poisoning, CO

## Signs of an Unwell Ewe.

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### Chest

Heavy, forceful breathing may be a sign of pneumonia, especially if the sheep is coughing.  
Rapid breathing may be due to stress, pain or heat.

### Ears

Drooped ears can be a sign of pain or illness.  
Check for infection around ear-tags.  
If only one ear is droopy and there is a head tilt (+/- drooling) this could be a sign of listeriosis.



### Nose

Thick or green nasal discharge is likely a sign of pneumonia/respiratory infection.

### Eyes

A cloudy or red, partially closed eye may be a sign of bacterial infection. This can be caught from other sheep, spread by flies or is from silage/haylage. There may be watery discharge from the affected eye(s).  
Look at the conjunctiva colour (pink fleshy tissue inside the lower eyelid) to assess for anaemia. Paleness may indicate liver-fluke or barber's pole worm.  
Sudden blindness in a heavily pregnant ewe may be caused by twin-lamb disease.

### Mobility

Signs of twin lamb disease or hypocalcaemia in lactating ewe's udder for toxic mastitis.  
Signs of CNS, neurological diseases or extreme

### Teeth

Teeth should be checked for missing teeth.  
Swelling of the jaw can be a sign of pain, discomfort or stress.  
Feel the jaw bones for tooth abscesses. If the abscess is at a lymph-node then suspect  
Swelling under the jaw (bottle jaw) can indicate liver fluke, worms, Johne's disease.

## Autumn on the Farm

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It's been a busy few months on the farm. Our woodland pigs were brought back down to the farmstead before the weather turned. They had the shelter of the barn as well as an outdoor area for them to clear as their last job.

Tupping time came around fast...and seemed to end even quicker. The ewes were then left alone for 6 weeks to give them optimum chance for embryo implantation, and then they were gathered, given a mineral drench and a body condition score check before being turned out again. Our new clover & herbal ley is still delivering the goods and our autumn lambs are looking great!

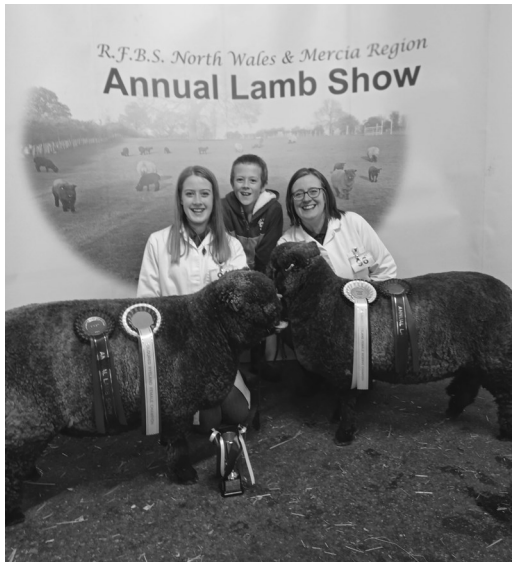


But the biggest change this autumn has been our new butchery unit. It was finally approved back in Sep-tember and we have been busy processing our mutton, hogget, our autumn lamb and our rare breed pigs. It's been a steep learning curve but we are in good hands with our experienced butcher; he does the skilled butchering and I make the sausages, burgers, bacon and of course pack the end product. The thing I failed to take into account was time! Running the farm and a family is a full time job but now I have another full time job to fit in....but hey who needs sleep anyway?! I do try to limit the butchery hours to two days a week, whether that is processing our own meat or private kills for other local smallholders. Any longer and I just don't get chance to fit everything in and I don't want things to slip which is often the case when you try to spread yourself too thin. A problem I think a lot of us will know all too well!

In October we decided to open a farm shop, a couple of days a week to make it easier for our local community to access our produce. Up to now we have managed to sell our produce by advertising on social media and offering free local delivery but this is very time consuming and obviously fuel prices haven't been very forgiving.

After experimenting with a pop up shop last year we decided a regular shop was perhaps the way forward. I designed a web-site with a page dedicated to our virtual shop; where customers can place an order for collection on Friday tea times just like click & collect; and then our shop is open for browse and buy on Sat-urday afternoons. So far it seems to be going well but being off the beaten track, we are under no illusion that building up that cus-tomer base is going to be slow. I'll keep you posted on that one.

Besides all that we attended the North Wales & Mercia Lamb show hosted by the English Winter Fair at Stafford; this officially ended our 2022 show season and what a finale it was! To say we did well was an understatement and it certainly felt like our Christmas had arrived early. We have worked hard over the last two years to improve our flock quite literally from the ground up, focusing our attentions on our grassland and soil management, as well as focusing on preventative flock health rather than being reactive. And all this work reaped its rewards with the fantastic results we achieved. We felt particularly proud that we achieved those results with purely grass fed lambs. Like I said earlier the clover and herbal leys have had out-standing results with our autumn lambs finishing an absolute treat. We have always received lots of help and support from our Ryeland family and I like to think that everyone took joy in our results as it certainly felt like a team effort.



So thank you to everyone for all of that help and support, we are very humbled and grateful for you all.

Today was back to reality, morning rounds, bacon slicing and packing in the butchery, drafting off some more ram lambs followed by an abattoir run this afternoon, school run, evening rounds, tea time, article writing, paperwork.....you know the drill!
